Aberlour launches new report on the public debt crisis



For years Aberlour has campaigned the Scottish and UK Governments around the public debt crisis. We've shown how public debt, owed for example to councils and the department for work and pensions (DWP), pulls families deeper into poverty across Scotland and the UK.

This means more and more low-income families are finding it harder to make ends meet and unable to afford day to day essentials. Our recent research, carried out by **Professor** Morag Treanor from the University of Glasgow and in partnership with One Parent Family Scotland and Trussell, delves further into the level of debts owed to public bodies and the impact on disabled people and lone parent families.

We've discovered:

of children with a disability are in a lone parent family. These families are most likely to depend on food banks and are at high risk of having fuel and energy debts/arrears

of British households receiving Universal Credit have a deduction due to debt

per month is being deducted from claimants' Universal Credit across Scotland We're calling on the Scottish and UK Governments to:

End Universal Credit rules that push families into debt e.g. two child limit, five weeks wait for Universal Credit

Expand council tax exemptions to all families living with a disability and lone parent families receiving benefits

Returning to our roots



This spring a lucky few of the Aberlour team returned to our Moray roots to mark Aberlour's 150th anniversary.

We celebrated with an afternoon tea party, hosted by our chair **David Robb**, at the Fleming Hall in Aberlour village. Guests joined us from all over the UK and included former residents and people connected with the orphanage and our charity.

Former resident Ron spoke at the event sharing that his entire childhood was spent at the orphanage having arrived as a 10-month-old baby, suffering from pneumonia, alongside his eight brothers and sisters.

During the event young people supported by our Youth Point service in Moray shared how Aberlour had supported them. Jack and Rhys composed and performed their own special tune on their bagpipes while Vange showcased the art created and on display by Aberlour young people - as part of the Aberlour 150th Creative Communities Project.

We had the honour of interviewing several of the former residents, including Ron, about their time living at the orphanage. Whilst positive about his experience at Aberlour, Ron welcomed the change from placing children in large institutions to housing them in small, family-style homes and said:

"The young children today have got a much better chance to get going in life."

He finished by offering an emotional message to those currently in care:

"I would like to encourage the younger people to stick to their guns, and not to give up on their dreams."

Aberlour expands support for new mums and babies across Scotland



We're delighted to announce that from this summer, thanks to increased Scottish Government funding. we've been able to extend the reach of our intensive perinatal support services to Glasgow, Tayside and the whole of the Forth Valley.

Previously our service was only available to mums and their babies living in Falkirk. Our team offer a lifeline support service to new mums affected by substance and alcohol use. We're there to offer practical and emotional help with the aim of keeping families together.

Last year **Ashley** and **Kerri**, mums we support, spoke directly to MSPs explaining that the service had helped to save and transform their lives and called for the service to be available in every postcode.

Kerri, mum supported by Aberlour said:

"I was on the methadone project, just starting my recovery, when my partner at the time died through drugs. That was the night I found out I was pregnant.

Being referred to Aberlour was a turning point. They became my voice and went above and beyond. They weren't just ticking boxes, it was personal. If my baby wasn't here with me, then I probably wouldn't be here. I'd have relapsed.

My life is normal now. It's looking good."

With the right support we can keep families together and we're thrilled that we can reach even more children and families who need us.

Ashley, mum supported by Aberlour said:

"I didn't know if I was going to be able to take my baby home, but I was referred to Aberlour and it felt like someone had got my back at last.

Every woman in every area should have someone like that in their corner. Every area needs a perinatal support service like this. It is a massive support. I was no longer on my own.

There is so much stigma around addiction and mental health but there is a trust there and it took just one person to see a wee bit of hope and things are totally different.

I'm proud of the mum I am now. My wee girl has changed my life, and I am entirely there for her." Voices of **Aberlour**

It sounds dramatic... but that first night changed my life

The club is run by Johnny, a legend in Govan, and it is impossible to overestimate what he has achieved with young people growing up there.

His club had a huge impact on so many of us. It was never just four walls and a roof, it was a safety net, a place where young people could find help and encouragement when they might not have found it elsewhere.

It changed my life and, over the years, there have been hundreds, thousands, like me.

I was 16 when I first went in 2008 and mad about karate. I had won a world title in my age group and was hoping to get to Tokyo to defend it but the cost looked prohibitive.

I just remember Johnny being totally engaged as soon as he heard about it, getting sponsorship, publicity, just doing everything he possibly could to help.

In the end, I got to Tokyo and retained my title but my respect and gratitude to Johnny and Aberlour goes far beyond that.

He helped me in all sorts of ways. I wrote my first CV with the help of the club, for example, and was coached for my first interview there.

Sometimes life can change in an instant and walking into that club changed everything for me and loads of young people like me.

It might be a swim, a chat or a walk in the park



It's all about the mums, what they want, what they think might help.

I've been a Perinatal Befriender since 2019 helping new mums who have been referred to Aberlour because they might need some extra support.

I'll do whatever is going to help make things a little easier for them. I'm there to help, to allow her to take a breath and decide for herself how things can work.

It's about listening, not judging, and giving women space to talk about whatever is on their mind.

I have always had an interest in the welfare of children and enjoy being around babies and children.

It's a two-way thing and I get so much from the mums I meet. The training of volunteers is terrific. It is a privilege to be alongside women and their little ones.

We are told that we are not there to "fix things" but to listen, provide a bit of space for the mums to offload and then work out what they need to do for themselves.

We are often working with quite vulnerable women and building trust is important but so is the relationship between the befrienders and our Aberlour coordinator.

It's all built on trust, good training and knowing support is there if needed.

It's so important to get the early years right when the babies are tiny and that ripples right through into adulthood.
